

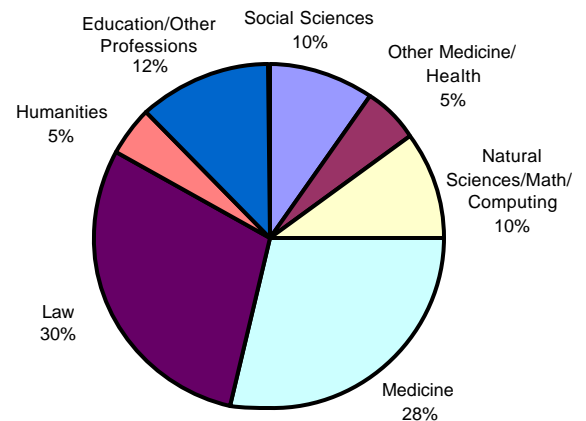
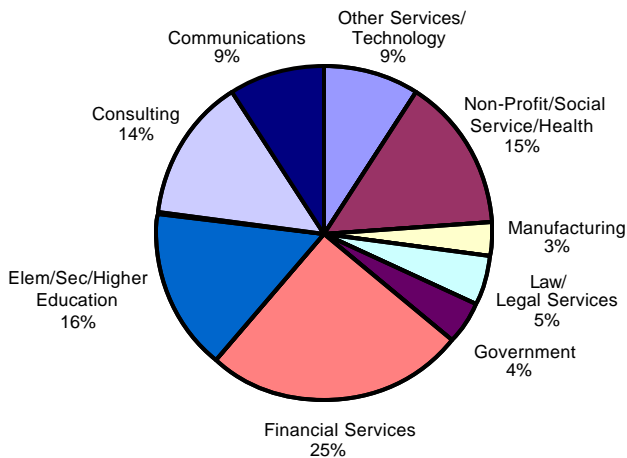

HIGHLIGHTS

School Breakdown: College of Arts and Sciences only: 1,528 (124 double majors; 15 submatriculants into GSAS); College/Wharton: 84; College/SEAS: 32; College/Nursing: 1

Gender Breakdown: 473 responses from women (60%); 308 from men (40%)

Average Salary: \$40,073 (up 9% from 2003) Range: \$19,000 - \$75,000

Observations: The upswing in selected sectors of the economy, most particularly in financial services, is reflected both in the impressive salary increase between 2003 and 2004, and the significant increase in the percentage of new graduates entering jobs in financial services (up 7% from 2003). One-quarter of the CAS Class of 2004 took jobs in financial services. Along with the increase in employment in the financial sector, there is a notable decrease in students taking government jobs.

The number of students enrolling in law school rose to 30%, after a decline in 2003. Coupled with medical school, these two professional schools account for almost 60% of graduate school attendance.
