

Environment/Energy (White stripe)

◆This section of the career library contains books, pamphlets, notebooks, printouts, and videos related to environmental policy, activism, and education, as well as to energy policy.

◆The following is a list of some of the resources in this section that prove particularly helpful:

Central Atlantic Environmental Directory, 1997.

A good resource for job and internship-seekers, this book describes and provides contact information for over 1065 non-profit organizations and government agencies concerned with environmental education and action in NJ, NY, and PA.

Complete Guide to Environmental Careers in the 21st Century, by Bill Sharp, 1999.

Although you won't find specific agencies listed systematically here, this book serves as a comprehensive reference on environmental career opportunities and how to get started. It discusses various fields in a thorough manner and offers an excellent supplemental resource section for each field discussed.

Directory of Environmental Websites on the Internet, by John Brainard, 2000.

An almost overwhelming number of Web-based resources are listed here by subject area, geographic location, and organizational type. This can be a useful tool before beginning an Internet search.

Plunkett's Energy Industry Almanac, 2001.

This is a current compilation of 395 of the largest, most successful energy companies in the world. Most are US-based, but 53 are foreign-based. This book offers a full-page of comprehensive statistics on each of the 395 companies it presents.

Greater Philadelphia Environmental Education Directory, by Trzyna, 1997.

A great resource for learning about environmental organizations right here in Philadelphia and for identifying potential internship and job sites.
